## **TEACHING EXPERIENCE**

### **George Mason University**

#### **Undergraduate Courses**

- Feminist Research Methods  
Introduces feminist approaches to research for advanced undergraduate students. Focuses on the techniques for collecting and analyzing and examines central methodological issues raised by feminist scholars. Emphasizes a learning-by-doing approach to conducting research where this course facilitates an experiential learning opportunity. Throughout this course, we will collaborate on the development of an actual feminist research project, deploy it, and analyze and interpret the findings.
- Foundations of Health Communication (Fall 2021)  
In this course we survey health communication theories, models, processes, strategies, and techniques as applied to public/community health, health disparities, and medical inequities and related to a variety of contexts. During the process of disseminating class material, student developed health communication interventions a the final project.
- Social Construction of Black Health (Spring 2022)  
This course will take on this deconstruction of Black health through the lens of power and privilege. Social constructions are inherently situated within and shared through communication processes at the intrapersonal, interpersonal, communal, and organizational/institutional influenced macro-level influences, such as structural racism, which is also a social construction. Course includes master's students.
- Foundations of Health Communication (Fall 2021)  
In this course we survey health communication theories, models, processes, strategies, and techniques as applied to public/community health, health disparities, and medical inequities and related to a variety of issues, such as perceptions of health, provider-patient relationships, health organizations, health campaigns, intercultural issues, and the use of new communication technologies.

### **Rutgers University**

#### **Undergraduate Courses**

- Special Topic Course: Health Literacy (Fall 2014, Spring 2016, Fall 2016)  
In this course, we will engage in discussions, problem-based activities through a service learning approach that focuses on applying health literacy principles to real-life phenomenon, including clinical encounters, as well as community and public health contexts with an emphasis on medically underserved and vulnerable populations.
- Health Communication (Spring 2010, Fall 2011, Spring 2012, Fall 2012)  
This course explores a model of health literacy that applies to health communication and promotion to enhance health outcomes. In this course we will engage in discussions and problem-based activities that focus on applying health literacy principles to communication, medicine, as well as community and public health with an emphasis on medically underserved and vulnerable populations. The

overall goal of this course is to introduce you to relationships between health literacy and health communication as well as learn how to collaborate with a community organization to design nutritional health messages for use in REAL neighborhoods.

- **Communication and Social Change: Community Engagement (Summer 2011, Fall 2011, Spring 2012, Summer 2012)**  
This hybrid course draws upon methods from community-based participatory research and health contexts to situate our ecological explorations of community engagement. This course is appropriate for students who are interested in corporate social responsibility, research at the community level, or working in grassroots and community-based non-profits.
- **Special Topic Course: Communicating Community & Identity in Health (Summer 2011)**  
This is a hybrid course in applied health communication. We will review actual transcripts from focus group interviews involving people who smoke cigarettes to investigate and link process, context, and outcomes. Specifically, we will form a 'research team' to investigate how stories from these focus groups 1) build and reflect a working class communal identity (i.e., process) and 2) link this group identification to personal health promotion (i.e., context) to 3) help shed light on challenges and assets in quitting smoking for lower income smokers (i.e., outcomes).
- **Interpersonal Communication Theory (Fall 2009, Spring 2010)**  
This course will explore how existing and new communication technologies facilitate and change interpersonal communication. In the process, this course provides theoretical and methodological foundations for investigating mediated interpersonal communication

### **Graduate Courses**

- **Decentralizing Academic Research: The Role of Community- Engaged Methodologies (Spring 2014) (Doctoral students)**  
This seminar interrogates what is viewed as valuable in academic research and present participants with interesting, evidence-based research models that seek to decentralize academic research by giving it back to the people we seek to study.
- **Experiences with Communication Participatory Research (Spring 2014) (Doctoral students)**
- **Special Topic Course: Community Health (Fall 2014) (Masters students)**  
This course is designed to introduce students to the field community-engaged prevention and methods of inquiry. By the end of this course, students will have an ecological understanding of the synergy between communication and community engagement in health and research, with an emphasis on health equity promotion. Students will apply this understanding to real world situations.
- **E-Public Health Communication (Fall 2010, Fall 2012) (Masters students)**  
In this course, the user is the point of entry. Some call this consumer health informatics. To make the most of e-public health, e- information for the consumer must be accessible, communicate health information needs, and integrate user preferences into the design, implementation, and delivery. This course applies an

interdisciplinary lens and questions the status quo in e-health communication, especially at this relates to the underserved health consumer. In our exploration of communicating e- public health, we will go survey the process of planning, design, development, implementation and evaluation in creating an evidence-based e-public health resource. Students will take away theoretical and applied understandings of inclusive e-public health communication.

- Capstone (Fall 10, Spring 2011, Fall 2011) (Masters students)/This course is a project management aid for students executing their capstone projects.

### **Additional Courses**

- **Communicating Prevention: A Community-Engaged Approach**, School of Public Health, University of Colorado (Summer 2013; 1 credit hour)  
This course will provide students with an understanding of the synergy between health communication and community engagement in public health and preventive medicine, with an emphasis on serving low income and minority populations. This course will apply this understanding to real world situations and partner with the Minority Health Advisory Commission (MHAC) of the Colorado Department of Public to understand how the legislative transition from the Office of Health Disparities to the Office of Health Equity will have state level implications as it moves from a focus on racial/ethnic disparities to all health equity concerns. This policy change and transition presents provides a focus for the collaboration between Dr. Warren's class and the MHAC to evaluate how the MHAC's key constituents and stakeholders making sense of the new labels, the messages these labels suggest, and how this impacts collaboration and communication between these groups.
